

# The Wamboin Firefighter

#### FOR ALL EMERGENCY CALLS



PREPARE, ACT, SURVIVE,

<u>Callouts and what we have been up to.</u> Since the last whisper, the brigade has been busy with training and call outs for 4 x MVA's.

We will be in the "Bush Fire danger period" until at least 31 March 2026. For the month of October, Wamboin brigade had the most permits applied for out of the 22 brigades in the Lake George District, which also happened during the last fire season on many occasions. Some applicants said there wasn't enough time in the 6 month "off season" to burn off, but the majority of residents were able to do so successfully in that period, without the need for a permit. October 25 proved itself to be the windiest month of the year, so not really suitable for those with permits, and many permits were suspended because of dangerous weather conditions. Remember, an application for a permit, is not an approval to burn or any guarantee that your application will be approved. The Bungendore waste transfer station will take green waste free of charge, so in many circumstances, a better solution to disposing of unwanted vegetation. Some residents will wait until the end of the BFDP with a pile they have, and by then it will have dried out completely. We appreciate those that do burn off in the "off season", as this does take some workload away from the brigade.

<u>Preparation for the Bushfire period.</u> We hope that most residents now know the "drill" of what to prepare for. One thing we see regularly is accessibility restrictions for fire trucks. 3.5 metres wide and 4 metres high as a minimum is what we need

to get a tanker in and out safely (not just the gate), but all road/track access, up near buildings and be able to turn an 8 metre long vehicle. Our driver will assess a property on arrival, and will not risk damaging communication aerials, satellite antennas, mirrors, lights or equipment attached to a tanker.

Ensuring your property can be easily identified can save your life or save vital minutes if a fire is involved. A reflective number, with large numbers (75 to 100mm) and if possible, seen from either direction of your road is a must. Most sign makers can easily make these for you at a reasonable price. Make sure you have a fire plan. Get one online of pick one up from the



brigade at the Wamboin markets. A plan is something that when done, gives you and your family clear instructions as to what everyone has to do, where to go, or meet in a place if you can't all get home at the same time. Mobile phones, internet, and other forms of communication do fail, more often when overloaded and when there is an emergency like a bushfire. Power to your home can be cut during a fire. Always have a backup like power banks or other means to charge your devices. If you lose



communications, ABC 666 radio will have alerts and advice when bushfires occur in the area. A portable radio with spare batteries is important to have. Keep you house surrounds tidy and clean your gutters often. Leaf litter in a gutter will easily ignite and possibly spread flames into your roof space if you get an ember attack from a bushfire. Keep grass around your home cut frequently. Native animals will generally help you if you keep it short. There is plenty of information available from your brigade on preparing your property. Reach out at our Community Engagement days at the Wamboin Markets!

#### What the Heck Chapts. 40/41

Back in March 1867, three months before Sutton was gazetted as a village, a meeting at Woodbury decided that the unused Wesleyan Chapel at Newington should be moved to Sutton, where it would be used for church services. So at a cost of £60 the first building in Sutton was erected. Being the only building in town, it was used for church services and as a school for the next 10 years. By 1877 it was deemed to have deteriorated so much that is was unusable.

Now at this stage the local people wanted to continue church worship, so services were transferred to private homes, shops, or wherever was needed, depending on your preferred religion. In 1901 the Methodists built a chapel at Woodfield. later the C of E's decided they couldn't be outdone, so with strong encouragement from Mrs Jane McInnes, they trumped the Metho's by building a church in the village. It was dedicated to St. Peter and consecrated in 1908 and was used regularly until it was attacked by White Ants in 1924. In 1925 a brick and render building was built to replace the condemned building which then had a reprieve as it was bought and moved to Tallagandra where it was used as a storeroom until consumed by the 1979 bushfire.

The replacement 1925 church building is still in use today, 100 years later. The Foundation stone was laid on 19 September 1925 (which was a Saturday) so on 21 September 2025, 100 years and a few days (this year the 19<sup>th</sup> was a Friday so we couldn't be exactly 100 years as we were all busy elsewhere) after that momentous Sutton event, a celebration was held to mark the occasion. The Anglican Bishop of Canberra Goulburn, Bishop Mark Short, joined the present day congregation, along with many other local residents and visiting past congregation members, to celebrate the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the stone laying event. The little church was once again nearly bursting at the seams as it would have many times during its century of life. We prayed for past members, sang hymns, and heard reminiscences of life in the church over the years. (However we did not freeze as the old-timers did because we now have heating.)

Following the service we all trooped next door to join with the Bishop as he dedicated and blessed the new church hall, which finally has been completed after many years. (This compares to the four months it took to build the church- guess they didn't have Council regulations or inspectors 100 years ago.)

When all were assembled the Bishop took his staff and knocked it against the door frame. Most of the oldies expected him to burst into singing 'I'm going to knock on your door" [Eddie Hodges 1961], but to their dismay he just said 'Let the door be opened'; probably because that is what was printed on his script. Inside the hall, the Wardens were thinking to respond by providing a choral rendition of the Hallelujah Chorus, but thought maybe that would go on for too long. So common sense prevailed and they simply opened the door. Bishop Mark then blessed and dedicated the new building, then all moved inside to the sounds of many 'oohs' and 'aahs', as well as the typically Aussie, 'wow'. Whether these were in response to the magnificence of the building, or the sight of the buffet lunch, we are not sure.

We all talked and ate and talked some more and listened to stories told by Ron Hardy and Peter Cartwright of their memories of their early church life at St Peters. This then led to discussing the attempts over many years to provide a toilet for the use of parishioners. This hall building in which we were gathered had over the years evolved from the planned provision of a simple toilet.

Thanks to decrees by Council, we have a building which is above the 100 year flood level and specifically built to survive a Tropical Sutton cyclone. And additionally we are the proud owners of the world's largest toilet (maybe). We had to modify the plans (twice) and now there are three toilets because Council said we must have at least one ambulant toilet and one accessible toilet (which had to include a shower). As a result, this accessible toilet is big enough to position a table and chairs then hold a meeting of 6 or 8 persons - plus one on the throne. I suggest no one use this toilet cubicle, if you are desperate, as it is a long hike from the door to the bowl.

Finally the congregation have their long awaited toilet. So we have banished the outdoor dunny, with its resident redback family, to the far reaches of the block. So the hall is finished, dedicated and ready for use by church members and by the community. – **Alan Rope**

#### Nature Notes – October 2025 Jo Walker

The temperatures are beginning to edge up - some a bit high for this time of the year- but we've had enough rain to keep the ground fairly moist and the countryside green. The worst part of the weather was the occasional strong winds. A lot of the land in Wamboin has shallow soils, causing tall eucalypts to extend their roots outwards rather than deeply down - and this makes them prone to falling in high winds.

The local Wattles have finished flowering and are now developing lots of seed pods. But, *Pomaderris angustifolia* bushes are bearing lots of small cream flowers. There are extensive patches of these plants growing along Sutton Road.

Hardenbergia violacea (False Sarsparilla) is displaying its bright purple flowers. It grows along the banks of Norton Road at the Sutton Road end, but is often a climber that twines its way through local shrubs. Another more delicate climber, also in the pea family, is the Twining Glycine (Glycine clandestina). It has smaller mauve flowers and trifoliate leaves and is a quite robust climber.

Peas with flowers in the yellow/orange range are also flowering, the most noticeable being the Leafy Bitter-pea (*Daviesia mimosoides*) which grows into a shrub a metre or more tall. The much smaller Showy Parrot-pea (*Dillwynia sericea*) is also flowering. And the similar-sized but bushier Heathy Bush-pea (*Pultenaea procumbens*) is covered in orange-yellow flowers.

It's been a good year for the Common Buttercups (*Ranunculus lappaceus*) growing in a moist area below my dam. The bright yellow flowers are dotting an extensive area – just over a hundred flowering at present.

It's a good time for the daisies too. Hoary Sunray (*Leucochrysum albicans*) can be seen growing all along Norton Road near Valley View Lane. And there are lots of minute blue flowers appearing on the tiny plants of the Narrow-leaved New Holland Daisy

(Vittadinia muelleri). An interesting and much taller daisy shrub (up to about two metres) grows locally in forest areas and is bearing clouds of white flowers right now. This one is Olearia

white flowers right now. This one is *Olearia lirata*.

It's time to keep an eye out for movement on local roads as more wildlife ventures out. I've already moved a Shingleback Lizard and a Long-necked Turtle to safety and have seen a Pacific Black Duck with a line of little ducklings following her and an Echidna on a road verge. We need to take care of our wildlife neighbours . Part of the satisfaction of living in such a wonderful place as Wamboin is watching them go about their lives close to us.



## How do I care for my Landcare plants? The potted edition

Around this time last year, our Landcare Whisper article gave you some advice on how to plant and care for your Landcare plants. The first piece of advice was to plant as soon as you can. What if you can't plant straight away? Then watering is key. Here are some pointers to help maintain your plants in their tubes (pots) for a short while if needed.

**Watering.** Make sure you water your plants at least once each day, twice on hot days if possible. Our plants are grown in forestry tubes, about 12cm tall and 4cm wide. The long, narrow shape of tubes can make it hard to get enough water into the pot. Watering needs to be below the leaves direct to the soil, or the water will simply wet the foliage and run off. This waste of precious water may create a humid microclimate which makes the plants susceptible to fungal diseases.

Water plants with light, rosette style nozzles to wet the soil rather than jets that can blast the soil out of pots. It might take a few passes to wet the soil properly given the pot is such a small catchment area. Most natives prefer good drainage, so allow water to drain away after watering and avoid leaving the pots to sit in water.

**Location.** Unsupported tubes may be unstable and topple over easily. Keep tubes securely upright to avoid them falling over. Locate them in dappled sunlight. Under a tree canopy or shadecloth that allows for around 50-60% shading is ideal. Be aware of structures such as brick walls or rocks that may radiate heat. This can be useful when it's cold, but plants can overheat if they are baking near a wall during the hottest parts of the day.

If you still can't plant after some time, consider potting into a larger pot as a last resort.

These tips will ensure your plants are jumping from the ground on your block instead of from their tubes! – **Leanne Brown**

#### Councillor's Column

G'day everyone,

I hope you all had a great October though if you're like me, you missed the memo about the shock return to winter and are wondering if I can wait it out of if I have to get the bag of warm clothes out again! The rain is great for dams and keeping things green but not so great for roadworks so I appreciate your patience as crews work to get repairs and works done in between the wet days.

The last month has been busy with committees, community events and Council work taking up lots of time. We started the month with International Day of Older Persons – a day when we recognise the impact of older persons in our community. It's something I'm passionate about and as Chair of the Seniors Advisory Committee I'm interested in doing some work on how we can make our region even more seniors friendly and ensure that people can stay in their homes for as long as they want to – something that is a challenge in Wamboin, Bywong and the surrounds given maintaining a property can be a hard ask. I look forward to talking to you about some ideas I have and getting your feedback.

Unsealed road maintenance has been—and remains— one of the issues I hear the most about in and around our area. For many years, Council has had a policy for how it dealt with unsealed roads which I was not satisfied with. After a lot of good work from our Council staff, a policy which I believe better addresses the way our regional and rural road networks are maintained has been developed. In the most recent Council meeting, I strongly advocated for the enhanced and more proactive approach to the Unsealed Road Grading Policy. I highlighted specific examples provided by residents (thank you to everyone who shared photos and feedback with me!) to underscore the need for consistent, high-quality maintenance. The policy is open for your feedback and will remain open for a few more weeks so I'd encourage you to have your say on the Your Voice part of Council's website.

I'm really pleased with a recent initiative I brought forward to deliver a youth hub for Bungendore. There's not much for young people to do in Bungendore and as the town grows, this needs to change. Following discussions with residents, parents, teachers, community leaders and local young people I brough forward an idea to provide fee-free space at the Community Centre to serve as Bungendore's Youth Hub. I'm in discussions with community groups about how to deliver this initiative and look forward to the seeing it up and running. It's turned my mind back to what we could do for young people in Wamboin and as I begin to develop my budget bids for the next budget I'd like to hear if you have any ideas so please get in touch.

Over the last weekend speaking to some RFS crews I was shocked to learn how many fires they'd been responding to already. It was a good reminder that we are in fire season (despite the cold and rain outside as I write this) and to be prepared. Please have a chat to one of our awesome local RFS crew members if you haven't got a fire plan already.

Finally, if you haven't already heard, the Australia Day awards nominations are now open! I was pleased to advocate for new categories of Community Group of the Year and Senior Citizen of the Year. They'll join the Young Citizen, Citizen and Event of the Year in Braidwood, Bungendore, Captains Flat and Queanbeyan. #### Our Federal MP's Report

The Australian Government is taking world-leading action to reduce online harms experienced by young Australians, by introducing a minimum age for social media.

From 10 December 2025, social media platforms will need to take reasonable steps to prevent Australians under 16 from having a social media account. Importantly, the onus will be on the social media companies to follow the law and ensure their users are over 16.

Delaying access to social media until the age of 16 will protect young Australians at a critical stage, giving them three more years to build real world connections and online resilience.

Thank you to members of the community who have made their concerns about the proposed Tarago incinerator loud and clear. I fully support the concerns raised and have made my own submission to the NSW Government Select Committee Inquiry on Proposed Energy from Waste Facilities.

I reiterate that I am categorically opposed to waste to energy in our region and have contacted the NSW Premier and Planning Minister on several occasions to voice my concerns. Sydney's waste is Sydney's problem. Regional NSW cannot be the default location for facilities that metropolitan areas reject.

This project has no social license, no regard for health or environmental risks, and is at-odds with the move towards circular economy.





#### **Kowen Kapers - Glenburn Shearing Shed**

Back in their heyday, shearing sheds were more than industrial buildings. In many respects, they were the heart and soul of the local community. As well as shearing sheep, the buildings were used for hosting dances and other celebrations during the shearing season. They became an important meeting point for people far removed at other times of the year. This would certainly have been just as much the case here in Kowen, as it was elsewhere.

Bulbeck & Boot (1990) suggest that John McInnes built the woolshed in the 1880s, making it one of the oldest in the ACT. Colin McAlister (2007) has provided later research that suggests that the central part of the woolshed may date even further back into the 1860s. Most of the present structure and associated sheep dip and yards are of later construction. The shed itself has been subject to extension and repair resulting in a mixture of original and later materials. Many of the additions were added during the post-war wool booms of the 1920s and 1950s. Glenburn shearing shed had its heyday in the wool boom of the 1950s when up to 10,000 sheep were shorn each season with sheep brought in from across the region.

Inside the shed there are several sheep and wool storage pens, wool classing tables and three wool presses. Moreover, the shearing equipment (overhead Lister mechanisms) originally installed 1922 (over 100 years ago!) is still in working order. Outside the shed are sheep yards and a plunge dip that was used to treat parasites.

Alongside the shed are the shearers' quarters which were constructed in 1950. Prior to that, shearers were accommodated in the Glenburn homestead. The corrugated iron building has six rooms and a hip roof (a four-sided roof with sloping sides) with two brick chimneys. There are six bedrooms with only external access (no internal access between rooms) as well as a communal living room and kitchen. An additional two bedrooms were later added as an extension. On the eastern side of the building you'll find another small brick and corrugated iron building with an iron roof that served as the meat safe. Other buildings in the complex include a laundry/shower block and the remains of a pit toilet.

By the turn of this century, the buildings were no longer used and had become neglected and vandalised. However, with heritage listing in 2015, conservation works have been carried out throughout the precinct, including on the shearing shed complex.

#### A Proliferation Of Dead And Dying Orphaned Dependent Kangaroo Joeys. What's Happening?

Local property owners have been reporting a proliferation of dead and dying kangaroo joeys during the last couple of months of winter. Some have been brought to our Possumwood Wildlife Veterinary Hospital, but almost all have died within 24 to 48 hours of arrival.

In all cases these have been normally dependent out-of-the-pouch joeys that have been orphaned. They have not had the benefit of mother's milk they would ordinarily have that is so important for their growth at this stage of development. Add to this the particularly bleak winter and the lack of feed in the fields at that time, a heavy burden of various kinds of worms and very high levels of stress have proved all too much for their survival and they just shutdown.

We have collected a lot of blood pathology data from these joeys before they died. Stress levels as measured by the cortisol hormone are generally three to four times the 'normal' level and calcium levels are dangerously low. Usually, the animal dies from respiratory failure. The animals brought to us receive IV and sub-cutaneous fluid treatment and are given calcium supplement, and worming treatment. They are then given lots of follow up TLC by our in-house rehab volunteers to reduce their stress.

The Humane World for Animals (formally the Humane Society) have asked us to continue our research work in this area so we can minimise the losses during future winters. The take home message is that if you see a dependent size joey (6kg to 15kg) by itself looking miserable and lethargic let us know and we will come and collect it. The earlier we can begin treatment the more successful we are likely to be. - **Professor Steve Garlick, Possumwood Wildlife**

For November I chose the Australian Pipit, a common resident of the local grasslands and farmland. Size: 16-19cm Status: Common breeding resident Australian Pipit (Anthus australis)

The Australian Pipit is a rather plain, medium sized bird, though they have a lot of character. Its overall buffy brown plumage, with dark streaking across the breast, helps it blend in well with its grassland habitat. It also has long, pinkish legs, a thin pinkish bill, white outer tail, pale eyebrow and face broken by a dark moustachial stripe. Younger birds are more heavily marked and mottled. Pipits are often seen perched up on fences, rocks or other vantage points in open areas, where their upright posture is notable. They forage by running on the ground, taking insects. They will often run in short bursts and if approached tend to run a short distance ahead rather than flushing at first. In flight, they appear fluttery, with a raised head and depressed tail (revealing the white outer feathers). They are usually seen singly or in pairs to loose parties, sometimes forming larger groups. Pipits have a thin, high pitched, quavering call, "tzweeer!", or sometimes a brisk "pip". They frequent open grassy areas such as grasslands, farmland and cropland, recently cleared pine plantations and alpine areas, avoiding more treed areas. There are several similar species

as the Singing Bushlark which is a lot smaller and squat, with a heavy, stubby bill, or the Eurasian Skylark which has a crest, stubbier bill, white trailing edge to the wing in flight and heavier, squat structure with short legs and a long hindclaw. Rufous and Brown Songlarks can also look somewhat similar but both are larger, Rufous has a bold rufous rump and plain breast, and Brown has a dark belly patch and appears very large and lanky. All of the larks also have a rather pleasant, rolling melodious song very unlike Pipit. If

## The Road that Never Was: the Canberra/Wamboin/Millpost/Bungendore road David McDonald (david@dnmcdonald.id.au)

Earlier this year I discussed, here in *The Whisper*, aspects of Wamboin's 32 roads. But another one was mooted at the time the first sub-division was being planned for our locality. In this 1969 *Queanbeyan Age* article, the 'residential sub-division' referred to was Majura Heights that later became known as Canberra Country Estates, and then (as now) Wamboin.

#### Direct road link possible

Queanbeyan Municipal Council has asked the National Capital Development Commission if it has any plans for the construction of a direct road linking Canberra with the main coast road near Bungendore.

The question was raised by Ald. R. Torrens, who said he had heard that such a road was envisaged and that businessmen in Yass Road, Queanbeyan, were concerned about the traffic which at present uses this route if future traffic is diverted.

The fact is that such a road was first mooted several months ago by Yarrowlumla Shire Council, which has already carried out some preliminary investigations.

The proposed route moves from Canberra's northern suburbs along the northern boundary of Fairbairn airport, moving into Yarrowlumla Shire a short distance before its projected junction with the Sutton Road.

The route then proceeds through the Kowen Forest area linking up with the existing Mill Post Lane, which joins the main coast road about three miles from Bungendore.

The proposed road would shorten the distance between Canberra and Bungendore and therefore to the coast by up to eight miles, depending on where the traveller resides.

A residential sub-division has already been approved in principle by the shire bordering the Sutton Road and the proposed new route.

It provides for the construction of a section of the proposed new road bordering the sub-division to main roads standard. The shire put the proposal to the NCDC, which advised last meeting that it believed the long range growth of traffic east from Canberra and particularly to the coast, will call for the planning of an improved road system.

The Commission stated it would be pleased to maintain liaison with the shire council on the matter.

The matter was still a live one in 1974, two years after the first homes had been built in Wamboin:

#### Road to bypass

Proposals to construct a direct road from Canberra to join the present coast highway at Burbong have been under consideration for some years, according to the Department of the Capital Territory. In a letter to Queanbeyan City Council, the Department said the proposed road appeared the most sensile approach to the overall problem of traffic in the Queanbeyan area. The Department was acknowledging receipt of a copy of the Pak Hoy report on traffic in Queanbeyan. It said many of the issues which had been raised concerning traffic between Canberra and the South Coast infringed on the responsibilities of the National Capital Development Commission. A copy of the report had therefore been forwarded to the NCDC requesting that it maintain liaison with council in the development of any proposals. Yarrowlumla Shire Council has had correspondence with Commonwealth authorities on an alternate direct route by-passing Queanbeyan and has suggested it pass through the Kowen area, joining the existing road near Bungendore.


