YARROWLUMLA COUNCIL NEWS

Septic Tank Licences By the time you receive this issue of the Whisper the Rates notices should out and you should have received your septic tank licence application form. As advised last month the NSW Government has introduced regulations relating to all septic tanks and aerated wastewater treatment systems. The regulations require all systems to be licensed before 30 September 1998 and regularly inspected. An initial application fee of \$30 will be charged for processing the application. This \$30 fee will cover the setting up of a data base, a survey to determine areas of high risk, an education campaign and an inspection of high risk areas in the first year. (High risk areas will be those adjacent to rivers or in water catchment areas i.e. near Googong Dam.)

Yarrowlumla Council can help with any advice on any issue, but if you have a strong objection to the entire licensing process (as I know some people have) please take it up with your local NSW Member of Parliament. This is a NSW Government Regulation imposed on the Council without any funding.

To help you out in maintaining your system and get it to a state where you will pass an inspection, the following is offered.

<u>Maintenance Procedures</u>: There are some maintenance procedures that need to be carried out regularly. Some care must also be taken not to overload the tank beyond its capabilities or harm the biological process in the septic tank. The following is a summary of what you need to know:

- 1. Periodically the sludge (inert solid material) in the septic tank builds up, reduces the liquid capacity, and allows the sludge to flow into the soil, which will clog up. Desludging is considered necessary when the sludge takes up half of the liquid capacity. Your septic tank should be pumped out every 3-4 years. If kitchen sink wastes are connected to a septic tank via a grease trap, the trap should be cleaned at least once a month.
- 2. Some additives to the septic system are harmful, and their use should be avoided. These include bleaches and strong detergents, particularly those containing chlorine.

Do not place newspaper or fibrous materials such as disposable nappies, sanitary napkins, paper towels etc., nor allow plastics, cigarette butts, bones and coffee grounds into the system.

The only beneficial additive is lime, which should be added when the tank is first brought into usage, or when odour problems occur.

- 3. In many cases septic tanks can become overloaded by both liquid volumes and by the excessive solid contents.
- Liquid overloading is easily caused by automatic washing machines and dishwashers. Large discharges of water scour the contents of the tank and force untreated effluent into absorption trenches.
- Solid overloading by the contents of garbage grinders, and by kitchen greases and oils, produces a similar problem
 when this material flows through the septic tank directly into the absorption trenches or collection well.
- 4. When trench breakdown occurs, the liquids normally absorbed by the soil or transpired by vegetation, break through ground surface in the vicinity of the trench. The trench breakdown can be caused by:
- Overloading with liquid volumes.
- The clogging of the trench with solids not trapped by the septic tank.
- · The fact that the tank needs desludging.
- The age of the trench.

The discharged liquid is highly dangerous, as it contains infectious organisms, causes odours, and attracts vermin and insects.

<u>Illegal Discharges</u>: Unfortunately many people do not realise the dangerous nature of effluent. They consider that the septic tank renders the effluent harmless. This is not true. Offences have been committed by siphoning the contents of the collection well or absorption trenches to the street or a watercourse, to offset the cost of having the collection well pumped out or by eliminating problems on properties. These offences are considered quite serious and offenders are liable to prosecution.

Rural Residential Addresses: The new rural addressing system is now fully in operation and you should notify your change of address as soon as possible. Failure to do so will mean lost mail particularly if we get a new mail contractor, even on a temporary basis.

STOP PRESS NEWS

In a scratchy Press Release late today (Tuesday 28 July) the Government has announced that the licences for septic tanks need not be completed until 30 June 1999. Not a lot of detail at this stage but I suggest holding off on the licence application at least until next month when I should have further information. I understand, but not confirmed, that some Councils may be charging hundreds of dollars for the licence fee hence many objections and possibly an investigation. (Note Yarrowlumla fee \$30.) Obviously more info to come but the rate notices posted today still have 30 Sept as the date for lodgement of the applications. I will keep you informed. (But in the meantime clean up your septic system -- and please pay your rates!) Peter Greenwood

WAMBOIN VOLUNTEER BRIGADE

Incidents There were no incidents requiring Fire Brigade attendance during July.

Finance: In last month's 'Whisper' I outlined the Brigade's mission and gave an overview of changes to the vehicle fleet. In this edition I will concentrate on financial matters.

The financial statement tabled at the May 1998 Annual General Meeting showed that in the last year the Brigade expended approximately \$21,000. This money was raised primarily from a combination of Subscriptions, Donations, Bank Interest and Fund Raising.

Each year Brigades are invited by the Fire Control Officer to lodge requests for new equipment. This year our request included the following broad categories of equipment: - personal protective equipment (\$1000), replacement hoses and associated equipment ((\$2500), protective clothing for personnel to be trained in structural firefighting to crew the new "Pumper" (\$3000), portable pumps for property protection as in the 13 March fire m Forest Road (\$1000), three hand-held CB radios (\$1500). Overall the request amounted to \$1346 l., In the event this Brigade, in common with all other Yarrowlumla brigades (big and small) has been allocated \$2900 to cover these items.

This is not intended to be a 'winge', none of us like to pay out through rates and taxes, but we all want - in this case - Fire Protection. It comes at a cost. The hundreds of hours of volunteer labour we expended last year were free and willingly given, but the equipment we need is not.


We have been very fortunate indeed in securing some much needed sponsorship in the last two months.





"How dare we take our Greenways for granted." A discussion by Paul D. Patti

After another weekend of stunning views, intriguing wildlife and peaceful experiences; courtesy of our Weeroona Drive Greenways and my wife's retired Dressage horse "Lucky", I am drawn to pen some thoughts on why future community policy for maintenance of these very valuable public assets must be pursued with all vigor. Since finally settling in the wilds of Weeroona, after 20 years of itinerant military lifestyles, I have become a weekly user of the winding trails that are one of the significant components of our Greenways.

Before proceeding, there must be a clear and definite "Thank you" to each person who has contributed to the establishment and ongoing life of the Greenways - this asset is of the highest community value and rivals walking trails I've seen and enjoyed in Germany, England and Denmark.

My concern is for the future of the Greenways. If the greatest levels of inclusive community consultation are not set in place and then maintained, what will be their fate? Can these fine trails be forever maintained by goodwill? What implications must be faced by our community under the Common Law "Duty of Care" provisions that demand that all users be provided with the safest possible recreational facility? Could a skew towards 'conservation in isolation' see the Greenways cut off from walkers, riders and runners because of real or perceived dangers to the sustainable future of this asset - the High Country debate is but one example. There is evidence to suggest that some Carers of the Greenways have a diverse understanding of both Environmental Engineering, Flora Management, Occupational Health and Safety and the needs of each group of Users.

We see siltation running across the Greenway, stifling flora and polluting waterways; a disregard for basic Civil Engineering practice and Environmental Protection Agency guidelines has caused a shocking major degradation of our resource! There are far too many instances of the ad hoc placement of unstabilised rotting branches and rocks, to fill in erosion channels that regularly bisect the trails. This practice is doubly inappropriate: the next rains move the timber down slope and the rocks either create larger wash holes or are themselves moved down slope. When soil stabilization is undertaken, the works must be safe for everyone - anchor bolts protruding from the surfaces of logs can puncture the sole of the human foot or tear flesh - our Equine friends can suffer an agonising death from Tetanus or other infections just as easily. We see other instances of timber felled and laid across the trails, wire fences and gates that are important access controls but are placed with little consideration for the safety of users and those beloved persons often seen cutting fire wood from the trails. Likewise there is clear evidence that some users of the Greenways have no long term vision of their beauty and sustainable heritage. Rubbish and the debris of humanity abound; is it too hard to carry every scrap out! Garden rubbish dumped for convenience will possibly spread weeds through the native grasslands. Branches torn down, shrubs trampled; established and stable walking and riding trails not used and new sensitive areas disturbed; there can be no shortcuts in sustaining our environment! Fences damaged, gates not left as they were found, trekking across private land instead of following the trail. Horses feet and black poly pipe were never designed to coexist.

A wise Director once told me, "Don't give me problems, offer solutions" - and so to some suggestions. A valuable engineering and environmental tool is the Master plan. This vision statement gives form and order to the collection of individual projects needed to keep the Greenways alive. We all must be able to sense our ownership of each little centimetre and of the entire resource that is the Greenways! - our chance to contribute will be sweeter as it will be a labour of love. This inclusion will also bring balance and offer consultation with each stake holder - it may be our objective to establish an all weather trail capable of daily use; likewise horse riders may be limited to fewer trails during the blessed rains of winter and spring. There could be separate public plans for access development, environmental engineering and flora management including revegetation. Regular inspection and supervised user maintenance of the Greenways could begin to bring more value to this asset. Ultimately financial support must be considered. Will it be possible to gain access to scarce Public funds via our Council and State Government without some solid planning and professional inputs from many disciplines. This is probably already on the agenda by the Committee that manages the Greenways on our behalf - I hope.

For each of us who use or live with the Greenway everyday, there can be real gains by earnestly thinking about the way we treat this part of our environment:

Rubbish is always carried out for responsible disposal later. Trails are followed and all flora is left undisturbed, unless instances of OH&S arise. Walk, ride and run smartly - Those gates, signs, fences and crossing points have been placed to benefit all of us. Sell others on the valuable experience you can have on the Greenway - if we all take a little bit of interest we can move mountains. Take action to report areas of erosion or overuse - correctly designed remediation will fix many problems before they explode. Leave the Greenway in a better state than you found it, if you can. To close off, please don't write me off as a passionate horse freak or an environmental tree hugger: I'm neither. I've been lucky to live and work in every state of Australia, mainly out of sight of big cities - but in the shadow of the varied environmental habits they are forced to employ. My rovings overseas have shown me some horrible pollution incidents and evidence of little foresight in open community recreational planning. Balance is the issue for me. I would hope that for the brief time of my ownership of these hills and trees along Weeroona Drive, that maybe I can help it be alittle bit more special for those who follow.

I'd be glad to learn about the problems other "Urban Farmers" have overcome and share some of the ideas we have tried at "Paudebaire". Call in for Coffee any time. Food for thought, I hope; Regards.

All Creatures Great and Small

A Continuing Series by Local Vet, Dr. Blair Lamont, BVMS, MRCVS

Wet and cold winter weather greatly increases the incidence of some conditions. One in neutered male cats is blockage of the urethra due to "sand" formation in the bladder. We find that many cats are less willing to venture outside in the inclement conditions and tend to urinate less frequently - plus often drink less if taking less exercise. This has the twofold effect of allowing urine to sit in the bladder for longer and thus increase the chance of "crystal" formation, and the higher concentration of urine through drinking less has a further enhancing effect on crystallisation. It may well be that other predisposing factors are also involved, but the end result is that a "sandy" precipitate develops in the bladder, and can stick in the urethra resulting in partial or complete occlusion. Neutered male cats are most affected - probably because the urethra is narrower that in entire males - possibly also because male cats expend more energy on "outside interests" and thus drink more. In the female, even when desexed, the urethra is too large to be blocked by the fine particles.

Often the first signs are those of urethral irrigation - ie frequent straining to pass urine, sometimes with vocal accompaniment; closer examination may reveal some drops of blood tinged urine in the litter tray, or on paper, bedding etc. As the condition progresses signs relate increasingly to bladder distension, and toxaemia from the inability to void the toxic by-products normally cleared form the body via the urino "uraemia". If you suspect this condition, seek veterinary advice URGENTLY, as permanent bladder and kidney damage and death form uraemia can occur within 40 hours from onset. (Many owners confuse the condition with bowel constipation.)

Treatment depends on the severity of the condition. In early, partial blockages injections may suffice; more severe cases may require anaesthesia and cathoterisation of the urethra with bladder flushing; the most severe cases may die despite surgical and medical treatments, fluid therapy, etc. In cases which merit it, a "sex-change" type of operation can offer the best hope of preventing recurrence - the penis is removed to enlarge the external orifice. Sometimes continual medication will suffice, but can be hard to administer and not always effective. It is also advisable to try and ensure adequate intake of fluids (to dilute the urine) eg, by exercise, increased salt, etc. Dry cat foods may be more predisposing that "wet" feeds but this has not been proved to date. A major advance recently in treatment / prevention has been the introduction of "special" tinned and dry foods designed to dissolve existing crystals and to prevent recurrence - they are very successful in most cases.

In conclusion, while this condition is more prevalent under certain conditions it also at other times, so be aware and seek early treatment if suspicious.
