

"Bonfire and Fireworks Cancelled"



At our last meeting we unfortunately had to cancel the fireworks and bonfire night. With the recent Covid outbreak and unknown situation moving forward, we could not reliably predict the situation when the end of August comes around. There was much discussion on the matter at our last general meeting and at the end of the day with the Covid-19 requirements for hosting a public event in an open and largely uncontrolled space, it simply became too hard to meet NSW Government compliance criteria with the proper tracking of attendees for contact tracing and the enforcement of Covid-19 distancing rules. We are very disappointed, as I know a lot of you will be, but we will have to wait another year. Sorry.

Yless4U Public meeting – Yless4U held a public consultation meeting in the Community Hall. It was reasonably well attended considering the cold winters night. Unfortunately for me it failed to answer many questions and in fact confused some issues even more. Is access up the greenway of via a neighbouring property (The presenter flipped around a few times on this point and in the end no one really knew the answer. Even more confusing was the neighbour in question after the meeting told me they had not even been consulted on this.) One of the best comments on the night I thought was "at Wamboin we really have not got much in the way of public facilities, the community Hall/Oval, greenways and Millpost Hill. We want to keep them". If you have already sent submissions to the local members and telecommunications authorities it was advised by the NSW Government spokesperson on the night to send them again after the meeting to reinforce you still do not agree. By the way don't forget to head up to Millpost Hill and enjoy a sunset on a crisp winter afternoon. Ah, the serenity.

The 2021 Meet the Candidates Night – Yes there is a NSW Local Government Election schedules for 4th September 2021. As per the WCA tradition we will host a Meet the Candidates evening on Tuesday August 10th at 7.30pm in the Wamboin Community hall in Bingley Way. The Wamboin Firefighter



- HOME FIRE SAFETY House fires can happen at any time of the year. Just like bush or grass fires, the key to surviving a house fire is being prepared. There are some simple steps you can follow to reduce your risk of a fire in your home :

-Most importantly, have an adequate number of suitable smoke alarms installed throughout your home and make sure that you test them regularly.

- -Change the battery at least once every 12 months.
- -Make sure you and your family know two safe ways out of every room in your home.
- -Have a written home escape plan in case of fire and practice it regularly.
- -Never ever leave cooking unattended
- -If you have a fireplace in your home make sure the chimney is clean.
- -If you have a fireplace always place a screen in front of it when in use.
- -Check electric blankets for damage or frayed cords before placing on the bed.
- -Take care to keep curtains, tablecloth's and bedding away from portable heaters.
- -Keep wet clothing at least one metre from heaters or fireplaces and never leave unattended .
- -If you use a clothes dryer make sure you clean the lint filter each and every time you use it.
- -Only use one appliance per power point and switch off at the power point when not in use.
- -Always extinguish candles or any other open flames before going to bed.
- -Never have candles or any other open flames unattended.
- -Store matches or lighters in a secure place not accessible to young children.
- -Remember that smoke from a fire can make you confused and that it is very hard to see in smoke.
- -When asleep you may not smell smoke and it can in fact put you into a deeper sleep.
- -If you have escaped from a home fire, remember once you get out stay out and DIAL TRIPLE ZERO (000).



Bird Of The Month

By Luke Downey

For July, I chose the Brown Falcon, a bird of prey that I have seen a lot in the local area recently.

Brown Falcon (Falco berigora)

Size: 40-50cm (wingspan 120cm) Status: Uncommon breeding resident

The Brown Falcon is a medium-sized bird of prey (raptor), that is distributed throughout Australia. They are quite variable in plumage, with many colour morphs. Pale morph birds are mainly white on the underparts, with pale tawny-brown upperparts. The darkest birds can be very dark brown (nearly black) all over, with a few pale "teardrop" markings on the face. Many birds occur which show characteristics intermediate between light and dark, with varying amounts of darker and paler brown and white in the plumage. Males and females look the same. Brown Falcons have fairly long, pointed wings which typically distinguish them from other raptors that are not Falcons. Light morph Brown Falcons are somewhat similar to Nankeen Kestrels (another common bird of prey), but Kestrels are smaller. Brown Falcons also have brown feathered "trousers" (feathers at the base of the legs) contrasting in pale morph birds which have white underparts, whereas Kestrels have white feathered "trousers" and underparts. Male Kestrels also have a grey head, and Kestrels of all ages have buff/tan-coloured upperparts (rather than buffbrown in Falcons) and black flight feathers on the end of the wings which contrast with the tan-coloured wings and back. Brown Falcons can only hover very weakly, unlike Kestrels (and Black-shouldered Kites) which can hover very well. Very dark morph Brown Falcons are similar to Black Falcons (quite a rare species locally) but can be distinguished by the front-on view in flight, where Brown Falcons have upwardly swept wings, and Black Falcons have bowed, flat or slightly decurved wings. Black Falcons are also dark on the underside of the wings and tail, whereas Brown Falcons always have at least some pale barring in these areas. Black Falcons typically lack pale teardrop markings on the face (except in worn birds) that are present in Brown Falcons. Brown Falcons are nomadic and more common in areas with suitable prey such as rodents, and have locally been quite more noticeable. I have seen several pairs along Sutton Road recently. They occur in grasslands, farmlands and open woodlands, and are often seen, singly or in pairs, sitting on fence posts, powerline poles or other high points in open areas, where they can see from a high vantage point.



Proposed YLESS4U Millpost Hill tower and the Fibre network project for Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton

Members of the Wamboin Communications Action Group (WCAG) committee attended the presentation from YLess4U at the Community Hall on Monday 21st June, in which they outlined their proposal to install a 12m tower on Millpost Hill. This proposed tower is positioned as part of the Connecting Country Communities project for which YLess4U have been given a grant. The NSW Government's Telco Authority is responsible for over-sighting this grant program and representatives of this agency attended and spoke to the meeting. That program is aimed at delivering a wireless based broadband service to a number of communities in the Monaro region, including Bungendore. It does not include the communities of Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton, as these are to be supported through the Fibre network project (being coordinated through the NSW Department of Regional NSW). As previously advised by WCAG, the construction of our Fibre network represents the first project under the NSW Gig State program. The Request-for-Tender (RFT) to support the construction and operation of this fibre network closed 3 months ago and responses are currently being evaluated by the government project team.

At the meeting on the 21st of June, YLess4U stated that the primary purpose of the Millpost Hill tower was to provide increased network capacity to support their customers in the Bungendore region - with the new tower delivering better connectivity back to Canberra.

During the meeting WCAG raised a number of concerns about the proposal, including that the establishment of such a tower was redundant given that the future fibre network would provide the backhaul connectivity that YLESS4U stated was the primary purpose for the tower. WCAG noted that, not only would this provide a superior technical solution, it would entirely avoid the need to establish this tower in our community for the purposes expressed. As some residents may recall, the significant opposition to communications towers being located in our community was one of the reasons that WCAG originally pursued a fibre network solution.

WCAG has contacted a senior officer in the NSW Government responsible for our fibre project and expressed the concern that there is an overlap between these two government funded initiatives. We have been advised that they will get back to us to discuss this concern in the next week.

WCAG has also made contact with the NSW Government Telco Authority (responsible for monitoring and oversight of the YLESS4U project) and expressed similar concerns. We understand that this team will look to make contact with the fibre project team.

WCAG would like to reiterate that this wireless project is completely separate from the Gig State project that we are currently involved in. WCAG is currently waiting on the outcome of the NSW Government Tender evaluation and will update the Community as soon as we have any further information. - WCAG Committee, wamboincommunications@gmail.com

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Protecting Our Waterways

Our region is fortunate to have an abundance of beautiful waterways, which are home to a diverse range of native wildlife including water birds, frogs, turtles, platypus, rakali, fish and other aquatic creatures. Many land-dwelling creatures also rely on them as a source of drinking water and food, but sadly, the human impact on these environments is often detrimental to these creatures.

Recreational fishing, when not undertaken

responsibly, is a frequent cause of phone calls to Wildcare Queanbeyan. Injuries often occur when birds and turtles become entangled in fishing line or are snagged on, or swallow, discarded fishing hooks. These animals suffer horribly, often unable to eat, swim or walk, until they are captured or die because of their injuries. If you are fishing and an animal becomes entangled in line or caught on a hook, the best thing to do is to call Wildcare Queanbeyan while the animal is still trapped. DO NOT CUT THE LINE. It is much easier to catch a tethered animal and quick action by the person who is fishing can save the animal considerable suffering and rescuers many hours of effort.

Platypus and rakali can also experience fishing-related injuries, swallowing hooks or lures. They can also drown if they become tangled in discarded fishing line or yabby traps. A recent study by the Australian Platypus Conservancy found that at any one time 4% of platypus are entangled in one or more items of rubbish, including elastic hair ties, fishing line and plastic rings from bottles and jars.


Responsible fishing requires that all rubbish and discarded fishing equipment - including lines, lures and hooks - are safely disposed of. Remember that the use of opera house yabby traps is now illegal in NSW (as of 30 April 2021). If you come across sick injured or orphaned wildlife, please phone Wildcare Queanbeyan on 6299 1966 at any time. – Bec Quinn, for Wildcare



Kowen Trail Run: Winter Trails 2021

This year our Winter Trails event, organised by the Wamboin Trail Runners Incorporated, was held on Sunday 20 June. It was great to be able to hold all 3 of our races – marathon, half marathon and 12 km. COVID-19 restrictions had reduced last year's event to only the marathon, so returning to our full set of races was heartening.

There's a huge amount of work which goes into preparing for and conducting the event. We're really fortunate to have, as one entrant wrote, a "Race Director Extraordinaire". She's assembled a team who look after course preparation, catering, parking and competitor support.

In terms of course preparation, we had 10 volunteers across 3 vehicles and 3 days to mark the 72kms of trails, mostly in Kowen Forest. Thankfully, rain only interrupted us once but the wind was piercing in a few spots, especially Mountain Break. The drivers enjoyed the opportunity to hone their 4 wheel driving skills although there are a couple of sections which are beyond the vehicles so some hardy 'foot soldiers' scaled Mt Doom and descended into 'the creek' and up to Western Break.

Hall set up starts on Saturday afternoon when half a dozen volunteers arrange tables, signage etc to ensure that registration goes smoothly and in accordance with our COVID-19 Safety Plan.

A dozen or so arrive at the Hall around 4:30am on the race day to erect marquees, set up stalls & fire pits and put race timing equipment in place. Luckily our Coffee Van Man arrives early too!!!!

There's around a dozen volunteers who work on the 'race matters' at the Hall – registration and finishing desk folk, COVID marshals, a first aid officer, merchandise sales, fire pit marshal, cleaners, etc. They start around 6am and work through to mid afternoon.

Our catering crew consisted of 15 volunteers, mostly from our local fire brigade. Some were involved with planning and set up in advance of the event and then everyone was involved in preparing and serving of food on the day. It's an early start at 5:00 am with clean up finishing about 3:00 pm. The crew member who claims to have had the hardest job was the one who collected 650 freshly baked rolls and had to endure the tempting aroma all the way back to the Fire Shed!

On the day, 19 firies volunteered their time to manage car parking and traffic management. Most started at around 4:30am to set up all the traffic signs, mark out the parking areas and manage parking in the volunteers' car park. Reinforcements arrived at 5:30am to help manage competitor parking – the first competitors arrived just before 6:00am and the last arrivals were around 8:40am. We had around 350 cars on the oval, 20 4x4s behind the fire shed and around 50 volunteer and spectator cars in the northern car park. Thanks to a huge effort by all involved we had most of the cars safely back out onto Bingley Way and heading home by around 2:30pm, and everything was packed up and put away by a little after 3:00pm.

Out on the courses there were around 25 volunteers – marshalling on Bingley Way, supporting runners at 8 drink stations, providing support cars in case of emergencies, taking photographs...

As you can tell, this event is run by volunteers and it wouldn't be possible without everyone's support. It definitely is a huge team effort!

Our sponsors provide prizes and are on hand for last minute sales of mandatory gear required for all competitors – runners and walkers.

Luckily the weather spirits were kind and it was a good day for running – cool, fine and not too windy. Dogs ran in all three events, offering enthusiasm and inspiration to their owners. The marathon had 85 competitors ranging in age from 20 to 74. The first two females smashed the race record. 5 people have run in each of the Kowen Trail Run Winter marathons over the years. 192 competitors completed the half marathon, with the first male across the line breaking the record. The half marathoners ranged in age from 16 to 74. Runners as young as 7 and as mature as 76 were in the field of 243 who completed the 12km course.

It's gratifying to be involved in the event – the runners are so appreciative of all our efforts as evidenced by them thanking volunteers as they run passed and the extra donations they make to the Wamboin Fire Brigade as they register for the event. All proceeds from the Kowen Trail Run series are donated to the Wamboin Fire Brigade.

Thanks so very much to all our wonderful organisers and volunteers. You help make the day memorable for all involved. Hope to see you next event!!!

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

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From the Corner

Council Elections (Part 2) — Following from my earlier piece on candidate nominations (The Whisper, April 2021), I thought it would be useful to cover some of the details of the vote counting process.

This will be, by necessity, a simplified overview. The interested reader should consult Schedule 5 of the Local Government (General) Regulation 2005 (https://legislation.nsw.gov.au/view/html/inforce/current/sl-2005-0487#sch.5) for a formal account of the process involved.

The first thing to bear in mind is that, while the Queanbeyan-Palerang Regional Council (QPRC) election is for eleven (11) councillors, and you will be asked to vote for at least six (6) candidates, you really only get one vote. The process by which that one vote finds its way to a particular candidate is the potentially complicated part of any proportional or preferential voting



system.

The second thing is to note that nominating the minimum number of candidates—in the case of the Queanbeyan-Palerang LGA, with eleven councillors, that will be six individual candidates if voting Below-the-Line, or one Group if voting Above-the-Line—may not necessarily be enough to make your vote count, even though it would otherwise be a perfectly valid and legal vote.

As mentioned in my previous article, the proportional representation voting system used in Local Government elections includes the option to vote either Above or Below-the-Line. With the 2016 electoral reforms that introduced optional preferential Above-the-Line voting for Australian Senate elections, all three levels of government now operate under a similar system, the only difference being the number of voting squares, Above or Below-the-Line, that must be marked to cast a valid vote.

For Local Government elections, when voting Above-the-Line, only a single (Above-the-Line) voting box needs to be marked to cast a valid vote. A valid Below-the-Line vote requires the voter to place numbers against at least half the number of candidates to be elected—in the case of QPRC that's six (6). Given the requirement for any Group with an Above-the-Line voting square to comprise at least half the number of candidates to be elected, the two methods of voting amount to the same thing—casting votes for at least six candidates. Apart from the relative simplicity of Above-the-Line voting, the difference is that, when voting Above-the-Line, preferences are fixed according to the order in which candidates are listed within the Group, whereas, when voting Below-the-Line, preferences are identified explicitly by individual voters.

Moving on to the process of actually counting the vote, under the proportional voting system employed in NSW Local Government elections, a candidate will be elected if and when they accumulate a *quota* of votes, a *quota* being equal to the number of formal votes cast, divided by one more than the number of candidates to be elected, plus 1 (*e.g.* if there are 11 candidates to be elected, and 12000 formal votes cast, then a *quota* will be 1001 votes). In most elections under the proportional voting system, there will be candidates who are elected without 'reaching *quota*', but we'll look at how this comes about in a moment.

When the ballot papers are first counted, they are 'allocated' to the first preference candidate (*i.e.* the candidate with the number "1" against their name for Below-the-Line votes, or the first member of the relevant Group for votes cast Above-the-Line). Any candidate with a *quota* or more of votes at this point is declared elected. Any over-*quota* votes, known as *surplus* votes, are then distributed to the nominated second preference candidates. The way in which the number of surplus votes distributed to another candidate is calculated is probably the most complicated piece of this particular puzzle and the interested reader is directed to the Regulation (referenced above) for the gory details. Suffice it to say that *surplus* vote preferences are passed on to the remaining candidates in appropriate proportions. When all *surplus* votes have been distributed, the candidate lowest on the poll is excluded from the count. That candidate's votes are then distributed according to the next preference

nominated on the respective voting papers. If this results in another candidate's achieving quota, that candidate is declared elected and any *surplus* votes are distributed. The cycle continues until only the number of candidates to be elected remain in the count and, at that point, any candidates that have not yet reached quota are declared elected regardless.

Next month, in the lead up to election day and with the above details in mind, I'll look at some of the less obvious ways in which your vote can influence the election result.

Nature Notes June 2021

The winter solstice has been celebrated, and now the days are starting to get – very slightly – longer. We still have quite a lot of winter to get through, but, so far, haven't had very cold nights – and the dam certainly hasn't been covered in ice yet.

We've had some heavy rainfalls towards the end of the month. I got nearly 40 mm in the rain gauge last week and could hear the water hurtling down the creek from the house. The ground has been moist most of winter so far and most of the shrubs here are bearing lots of buds – so it should be a lovely spring.

Not much is flowering at the moment – just a few of the early Wattles. The prickly *Acacia genistifolia* shrubs are covered in cream flowers. And I have one Silver Wattle (*A. dealbata*) on the hillside across the creek that is covered in bright yellow flowers – while all of the other Silver Wattles here are still in bud and will be that way for a few more weeks yet before they flower.

The damp soils seem to have stimulated the Bluebells (*Wahlenbergia stricta* and *W communis* are the most common species in this area), and lots of their leaf clusters are making an appearance.

Melichrus urceolatus (Urn Heath) is still bearing lots of its tubular cream flowers – which are attractive to some of the Honeyeaters. The short, suckering Peach Heath (*Lissanthe strigosa*), which can extend across a metre or more of suitable ground, is covered in clusters of small dark pink buds – and the Daphne Heath (*Brachyloma daphnoides*) is producing larger and paler pink buds.

Lizards are usually tucked away from the cold and hibernating by now, but towards the end of the month I found a Shingleback Lizard by the roadside. Unfortunately, it had been injured slightly, but partly eaten and had to be euthanased.

Perhaps because of the cold weather, several large Huntsman Spiders have decided to seek refuge inside. I used to be an arachnophobe, but since spending over thirty years in Wamboin have come to tolerate one or two eight-legged visitors.

There are still lots of the little black millipedes around, including indoors. These are not native but are Portuguese Millipedes (*Ommatoilus moreletii*) which first made an appearance in the vicinity of a South Australian port, so probably came into the country by ship. They are not eaten by anything as the produce a chemical deterrent.

Yesterday, just as I was about to write the Nature Notes, I noticed a Wombat lying in an unusual position in the open area down from the house. Investigating, I found it had a large shallow wound on the back of its neck and head. It was a young male Wombat, so had probably had a fight with another male. After arranging for it to be picked up and taken into care, I was surprised to hear the large flock of Sulphur-crested Cockatoos perched in a nearby tree begin to screech deafeningly at it. They often do this if they see a predator such as a fox or a dog, but I'm not sure why they picked on an injured native animal. The Wombat eventually took shelter amongst some bushes which made the late afternoon rescue rather more difficult in the fading light. But, the Wombat is safe now and being treated for its injuries. Wamboin is the source of so many interesting happenings!





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
