



Callouts this month.

Callouts included 3 x MVA's, 2 x Ambulance assistance, and 1 x Refuse fire.



"Callouts" How it all works.

For some time now, we have been using the "CAD" (Computer aided despatch) system. The new CAD system improves our response time by recommending the closest, most appropriate resources to respond to incidents. CAD gives the RFS a better integration with other emergency services, and the ability to dispatch more efficiently. This is a large change for the organisation, and starts to bring together a number of the priority projects including RFS ACTIV and the Mobile Data Terminal project that is currently underway. What is CAD? CAD is an integrated dispatch system that will bring

together our existing dispatch processes and systems to enhance the way we respond to emergency incidents. This computerised call receipt and dispatch system will help streamline our dispatch process and improve our response time by automatically ensuring the closest, most appropriate resources are dispatched. Automatic Vehicle Location (AVL) will provide CAD with real-time data on the location and availability of appliances whenever they are within a Government Radio Network (GRN) coverage area.

"Paging system"

While we still use the old pagers as a backup, active members (meaning those that are trained to respond to incidents) use what is called **RFS ACTIVE.** This is a phone based app, only available to RFS members. Members are notified of incidents on their mobile device, and are able to respond with their availability to attend by the touch of one button. Tracking occurs to show how long it will take them to get to the fire station and the brigade as a whole can tell that the appropriate people will be able to "man" a truck. The incident is listed on the members mobile device and shows those members that will be attending. We need a crew leader or field officer to run the crew, we also need a qualified driver in the crew. Field officers can "build" a crew and assign members to a particular truck from their own device. The ACTIVE system is linked to their CAD system meaning that the operators in RFS Sydney can see in real time what trucks and members are available. Other "out of area deployment" requests can be sent to members as well. Once in the trucks, we now have a status panel on the dashboard, where we can indicate, that we are responding, on scene, available back at station and other conditions by just pushing a button and not having to make radio contact.

Improvements are continuing all the time to make things easier for us and making the service more efficient.





The six coldest weeks occur after the winter solstice which is on 21 June. Whilst June 21 is the shortest day it does not have either the latest sunrise or the earliest sunset. The earliest sunset occurs about 1 week before the 21st and the latest sunrise about 1 week afterwards. This phenomenon is due of the tilt of the Earth and that the Earth's path around the Sun is not a circle, but more like an oval.



Bird Of The Month

For June I chose the Fuscous Honeyeater, an irregular visitor to the local area, that disperses down from the mountains during the winter months.

Fuscous Honeyeater (Ptilotula fusca)

Size: 15-16cm

Status: Uncommon winter migrant

The Fuscous Honeyeater is a medium sized honeyeater, mostly brown all over, darker on the upperparts and head, becoming paler buffy below. The wing edges, tail and head are more olive-yellow-brown than the rest of the body. They have a distinctive yellow streak on the side of the neck, and in winter also have a yellowish bill and eye-ring around a dark eye (both of these become dark during summer when breeding). The name "Fuscous" means a dark sombre brown colour and is a nice description of the brown colouration of this bird. They have a variety of calls, most commonly a whistling "pitty-quoll", and "tew-tew-tew" contact call in flight. Fuscous Honeyeaters usually occur in small groups amongst larger mixed flocks of small birds, especially with other Honeyeaters such as White-naped, Brown-headed and Yellow-faced. They are a migratory species that undertakes short-distance migrations to higher altitudes to breed in the mountains during summer, returning to lower areas in winter. They also move in accordance with the flowering of eucalypts and other trees, since they rely on the nectar (as well as occasional insects) for food. They move around a lot and may only be in one place for a few days before moving on, or could be seen passing through on their autumn or spring migration. They are similar to a few other Honeyeaters such as Yellow-faced and White-plumed but have very plain brown

plumage including a completely brown face with the yellow neck streak the main distinctive field mark. Make sure to keep an eye out for Fuscous Honeyeaters as they move down into the local area over the coming winter months.

Fibre Network update – Wamboin Communications Action Group (WCAG) – May 2023

This network is being built and operated by Opticomm Pty Ltd under contract with the NSW Government. This will see some 1,400 homes and businesses across Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton being connected to a fibre to the premise (FttP) based broadband service. The fibre connection is provided at no cost to residents. Charges to use the network are comparable to NBN related fees and residents can select from any of the over 50 retail service providers listed on Opticomm's web site. Residents can check that their property is included in the rollout and register their contact details at https://www.opticomm.com.au/nsw-regional-network/

Opticomm commenced the construction of the network in late 2022, with a target date set for the completion of the network's construction being December 2023 (as announced by the former Deputy Premier).

At this stage WCAG understands that work in Sutton Village and much of Sutton Park (south of the Federal Highway), has largely been completed. Over the last month many Wamboin and Bywong residents have contacted WCAG to ask for advice on when they should expect to see construction taking place in their area and/or being able to be connected. Unfortunately, despite numerous requests over the last six months, WCAG has not been able to obtain any advice on the planned rollout sequence or timeframe from either Opticomm or the Government project team in the Department of Regional NSW.

On 19 May 2023, WCAG met with our new state member Steve Whan to brief him on the project and the importance that the community places in its early completion. During that meeting we emphasised the need to get, at a minimum, an outline of the proposed rollout sequence for the remainder of the year, as well as confirmation that the project is on schedule for completion by the end of 2023.

Finally, some residents in Sutton Park have contacted WCAG recently regarding the Communications Pack they had received regarding the installation of fibre across their property and/or the lead-in to their residence. This correspondence included a request to sign a waiver. The following points summarise what WCAG understands to be the reasons behind this request:

- OptiComm will require access to properties in order to install equipment (if you accept the offer of fibre to the premise).
- The installation and maintenance activity will be carried out by Universal Communications Group (UCG) as OptiComm's approved delivery partner.
- Schedule 3 of the Telecommunications Act 1997 permits OptiComm and UCG (as their delivery partner) to enter and inspect land, install equipment and undertake maintenance to telecommunications facilities at your property (in the same way Telstra may have done over the years).
- UCG will work with you to find the optimal pathway through your property, including the external trenching and fibre installation through to the installation of the Premise Connect Device (PCD) outside your home and the wall penetration through to the Wall Plate and Network Termination Device (NTD) inside your home.
- There are processes to object to proposed activities and / or lodge complaints if you suffer financial loss or damage as a result of carrying out the activities.
- The communications pack also includes a request to waiver the required notice period under the Telecommunications Act. i.e. normally the carrier needs to give 10 business days' notice before engaging in activity. OptiComm is asking you to waive this requirement and class the communications pack as this notice.

Even the seventies and eighties services in Wamboin at the community hall would have been a little nippy. Of course the St Andrews building was fitted with inbuilt electric heaters when constructed and has since had split level air conditioning installed, so cold weather services in there are relatively luxurious.

But the faithful who turn up to winter services at St Peters these days still wear multiple layers of clothing, despite the building now having electric heaters. The building was not constructed with insulation properties in mind, just one room with high ceilings and brick walls. But personal warmth is generated by the friendship and worship. Plus the knowledge that it will only be for about one hour, then tea, coffee and cakes will be consumed to warm the inner body.

We must admire those nineteenth and early twentieth century Sutton district people who, rain hail or shine, regularly trotted along to a Sunday service in St Peters. I doubt they had a fancy morning/afternoon tea to look forward to after the service.


When I was a kid, at my churches (we moved a lot when I was young) there was no morning tea. Just before the sermon, all the "young people" would be told to up and leave (much to their pleasure) for another room, or building, for Sunday school, where you could cause havoc in the life of a prim and proper Miss, (or a trembling teenager), by talking and misbehaving as she/he tried to explain one of the NT parables. The only time you were interested was if she/he told an OT story such as the parting of the Red Sea

then drowning the baddies, or Joshua marching around Jericho playing a trumpet, or Samson destroying the Temple.

Meanwhile back in the church, I presume the adults (and babies) were listening to the sermon. I do not know because I was not there. (For all I know, they may have been having morning tea.) When the service finished the preacher would walk to the front door, then the congregation would file out and shake his hand as he frantically tried to remember their name, and they would congratulate him on a great sermon, even though some had probably not understood or heard a word he had said. Parents would wander over and collect their offspring from the belief-destroyed teacher, and head back home.



A Chronology of Wamboin and District, Part 16: 2007 to 2011 David McDonald

The fifth edition of an historical timeline of our local area, titled 'A Chronology of Wamboin and District, NSW', is available at the Wamboin Community Association's (WCA's) website. Visit https://www.wamboincommunity.asn.au/ localhistory/ and navigate through the left-hand-side menus Wamboin Locality | Chronology. It commences with a synopsis for readers seeking a brief overview of the history of the area.

This is the 16th article presenting some items from the Chronology that focus specifically on Wamboin and district, rather than the broader, contextual happenings. It covers the period 2007 to 2011, and future issues will continue the series. The full version of the Chronology at the WCA website provides the documentary sources underpinning these contents and, in some cases, additional information, as well as other entries for the time period covered below.

Date	Occurrence/comment
2007, 29 Jun	The Whisper announced a combined Bywong/Wamboin Short Story Competition with three entry categories: primary school students years 4-6, high school students, and adults. The winning entries were published in <i>The Whisper</i> over the following months. It was organised by a committee led by Nora Stewart.
2008	From this year onwards, ' all Lark Hill estate wines receive "Certified Biodynamic" labelling'.
2008, March	The Palerang and District Bulletin commenced publication in print format, editor Maria Taylor (Bywong resident). It moved to an online format in October 2017.
2008, 16 Mar	Members of the Gearys Gap/Wamboin Landcare Group and the Wamboin Community Association planted some 800 native trees and shrubs along the greenway that cuts across the newly developed Birchmans Estate sub-division.
2008, May	Lofty Mason, Dave Argaet and Charlie Montesin from the Wamboin Community Association met with Palerang Council staff to discuss the proposed Wamboin Locality Sign for the corner of Norton and Sutton Roads. The Dec 2008/Jan 2009 issue of <i>The Whisper</i> (p. 3) reported that 'The locality sign on the corner of Norton and Sutton Roads should be complete by the time you read this. Many thanks to Dave Argaet and his team for all their hard work. It looks great and is a fitting entrance into Wamboin!'
2008, 27 Nov	The <i>Canberra Times</i> advertised the '40 spacious blocks from 2.5Ha to 103.81Ha' for sale in the new subdivision of Birchmans Estate, Wamboin.
2009, Mar	Valuable biographical information was published at the website of the Bywong Community, Inc. on Les Reardon of the 'Clare' property (Edward Leslie Joseph Reardon (1915-1993)), Yarrowlumla Shire Councillor, and of how the Les Reardon Reserve at Bywong came about. Additional information on the origins of the Les Reardon Reserve was published in the March 2009 issue of <i>The Whisper</i> . It corrected and expanded upon information on the topic published in the previous month's <i>Whisper</i> .
2009, Aug	Palerang Council commissioned a cultural heritage assessment of its existing tip site in Macs Reef Road, as part of its proposed waste transfer station development. It reported that 'No previously recorded Aboriginal or historic (European) archaeological sites occur at the tip and no archaeological sites or areas of Aboriginal archaeological potential were located during the survey. The probability that undetected Aboriginal artefact would be impacted by the proposed rehabilitation of the tip is considered low to very low'.
2009, 18 Dec	'In 2009 St Andrew's church held the first of an annual Nativity Pageant in the grounds, with parishioners playing the roles of the humans, along with live animals including sheep and donkeys. These pageants regularly attracted an audience of around 200 local people and continued each Christmas Eve for 9 years. The Pageant was discontinued due to the difficulty in finding enough "actors" to play the parts.'
2010	Publication of what may be the first book on Wamboin: Jenni Colwill & Bruce Bowden's Wander through Wamboin: a celebration of rural living: stories about Wamboin, Frogmouth Communications, Wamboin, NSW.
2010	Early in the year, Telstra applied to construct a mobile phone tower of up to c. 30 metres in height, atop Millpost Hill. The Wamboin Volunteer Rural Fire Brigade strongly supported the proposal on the grounds of community safety. Following community opposition, and Telstra's reconsideration of the location, the proposal was withdrawn.
2010	Publication of Gearys Gap/Wamboin Landcare Group & Taylor, M 2010, Look after your natural assets: Landcare for the bush block and small farm acreage in the upper Murrumbidgee Catchment, 3 rd ed ⁿ , Upper Murrumbidgee Catchment Coordinating Committee, Canberra, A.C.T.
2010, April	Palerang Council's General Manager, and some prominent Councillors, expressed strong opposition to the proposal to replace the Macs Reef Road landfill site with a Waste Transfer Station (WTS) there. Their proposal was for the residents of Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton to take their waste to the Bungendore landfill, and to pay a tip fee there. Council agreed (by one vote) to building the Macs Reef Road WTS, which was opened in December 2014, and the landfill there closed.
c. 2011	Warramunga Greenway created, running between Norton Road and Warramunga Close. Named after the property of the landowners who created the sub-division, Diana and Keith Gascoine. Their property was named after HMAS <i>Warramunga</i> , on which Diana's father served.
