



#### Callouts and what we have been up to.

Since the last whisper, the brigade has been busy with 4 MVA's, 1 x ambulance assist, 1 x powerline down, 2 x grass fires. The biggest callout was for a fire which started from burning paper that quickly spread around buildings, destroying a shed, building materials and spread into a neighbouring property. Six different brigades were called to contain the fire that could have easily impacted the local area. The wind was the main reason that the fire spread so quickly.

### **Dry Autumn**

The dry weather has continued into Autumn, and a number of fires have occurred in the state. Of concern is escaped pile burns throughout NSW. At <u>all times of the year</u>, you must take precautions when burning off and have the means to control, contain or extinguish a fire you light. A fire that escapes your property and causes damage to another person's property can result in charges brought against you. (notifications on the RFS portal are mandatory, 365 days a year, even when we are not in the bushfire danger period)

#### Pile burns

The brigade has had a number of callouts via 000 calls for pile burns. Large bonfires can cause concern for the public where extremely high flame height occurs. A recent pile burn was seen several kilometres away from the fire and sometimes this can be



mistaken as a house or building fire that can result in additional resources getting called out unnecessarily. "Standards for pile burning" is a publication available on the RFS website. Piles should be no more than 1.5 metres high and logs should not be more than 150mm diameter. Pile burns are not bonfires. Large pile burns can produce extreme radiant heat, damaging fences, powerlines or worse, buildings. Grasses from radiant heat can ignite well away from the cleared area and take people by surprise as a grass fire quickly spreads. You can always have multiple piles and burn one at a time until the intensity has dropped. At all times of the year when burning, YOU MUST have a water supply available and any other tools necessary to control, maintain or extinguish the fire. The publication can advise of many requirements and recommendations so you can burn safely and responsibly.



Lots of locals ask for contacts to help with projects. We hope these are a helpful start!

The Yass Area Network of Landcare groups (YAN) is a network of local Landcare groups: Bowning-Bookham Districts, Murrumbateman, Sutton, Gearys Gap/Wamboin and Yass. YAN supports several nurseries, and habitat linkage projects. Their Climate Ready Revegetation project facilitates easy annual monitoring of your planting over three years. This project is detailed on the YAN nurseries website <a href="https://yan.org.au/member-groups/yan-nurseries">https://yan.org.au/member-groups/yan-nurseries</a> along with the YAN newsletters. While you are there, look for the May YAN newsletter which features an excellent article with tips for successful revegetation planting. Visit the YAN website yan.org.au for more information.

The **Sutton Landcare** group is working on the Sutton Reserve behind Sutton Primary School, where a valuable original native box woodland is being inundated with weeds. This project has already removed significant weed infestations with more work planned. ## Wildcare

On Saturday 24 May, the Wamboin community had the privilege of hosting Wildcare's Basic Macropod Rescue & Care course, held right here in Wamboin at the Community Hall on Bingley Way. This full-day training brought together locals and wildlife enthusiasts keen to learn how to support the rescue, rehabilitation, and release of some our most iconic native animals Kangaroos, Wallabies, Wallaroos and Wombats

Designed for beginners, the course is ideal for anyone who has little or no experience but is interested in becoming a wildlife carer. With a strong focus on practical and compassionate care, the program covered essential topics including:

- What it means to be a wildlife carer and how the carer network operates
- Basic macropod anatomy and how to identify different species
- How to determine the developmental stage of joeys and adult macropods
- Rescue techniques, initial assessments, and safe transport
- Day-to-day care practices for macropods in rehabilitation
- Basic first aid and recognising health issues

Participants received a comprehensive set of course notes, and the day included hands-on learning and engaging discussions with experienced carers. It was wonderful to see such a diverse and committed group in attendance. Locals from Wamboin were joined by participants from Googong, Queanbeyan, and Bungendore, while others travelled from as far afield as Shoalhaven Heads, Vincentia, and Jervis Bay to take part.






# **WPC MOTHERS DAY RALLY 2025**

### Wamboin Golf



# **Kowen Kapers - Glenburn Precinct Peter Komidar**

It may come as a surprise to learn that as well as being the site of Canberra's largest pine plantation, Kowen is also home to an important heritage area. Known as the Glenburn Precinct, the area was entered onto the ACT Heritage Register in 2015 as "an excellent example of a 19th century pastoral landscape". The listing, as subsequently amended on 9 February 2017, covers the Glenburn valley from just north of the Glenburn Homestead south to the Molonglo river.

The Glenburn Precinct contains evidence of mineral exploration, sheep farming and subsistence farming. It shows how a small community formed in the area, supported by shared resources of a shearing complex and school.

The Glenburn area was first settled by Europeans in 1831, which is early in the history of the Canberra/Queanbeyan region. The very first European settlers were squatters Luke and Mary Colverwell, both ex-convicts. Subsequent settlement was

influenced by widespread gold and copper prospecting in the area from the 1850s. Following the introduction, in 1861, of the *Lands Act*, there was an increase in the number of people settling in Kowen for the purpose of grazing stock. With an inn nearby and a proposed railway from Sutton to Queanbeyan (later from Bungendore to Queanbeyan), purchasing land in Kowen would have been considered a sound investment.

Over the years, the area became home to a vibrant rural community with many families living on small holdings or working for absentee landlords. It even had its own railway station. However, by the turn of the 20th century most of the families had left: due to the poor soils, low rainfall, small landholdings, rabbit plagues and broader unfavourable economic conditions.

All of the land in Kowen, including in Glenburn, was subsequently resumed by the Commonwealth in 1915 after the formation of the Federal Capital Territory (as it was then called) and from 1927, Kowen began to be planted with pines. While the Glenburn precinct escaped the pines, primarily because its soils were considered too poor, by 1980 almost all of the rest of the rural land in Kowen had been converted to plantation with the pre-existing built landscape destroyed.

While much of what the early residents built has been lost to the pine plantation, many relics of early colonial settlement still remain in the Precinct. These include remnant buildings, fences, roads, fords and fruit trees. In succeeding issues of the *Whisper*, we will explore the various heritage sites within Glenburn Precinct.

**Directions** Bingley Way Entrance: Starting at Bingley Way (A) walk to the Bingley Way horse entrance (B) and turn left at Wamboin Break. Follow the fence line until the first intersection (sign posted) and turn right onto Jack's Break (C). Travel along Jack's Break

for 2.7 km until you reach a signposted intersection with Fearnside Way (**D**) (The Fearnside Way sign is only propped up against the base of the Jack's Break sign, so may be obscured from view). Turning left onto Fearnside Way continue on until you reach the next intersection. At this intersection you'll find a right hand turn. Continue along Fearnside Way past the intersection for another 30 m and you reach the main intersection of Fearnside Way, Charcoal Kiln Rd and Keef's Rd (also signposted) (**E**). Proceed down Charcoal Kiln road for 1 km until you reach a locked gate with a pedestrian entrance (**F**) - the entrance to the Glenburn Precinct.

<u>Charcoal Kiln Rd Entrance</u>: Alternatively, starting from the Charcoal Kiln Rd entrance off the Kings Highway (**G**), follow Charcoal Kiln Rd to the locked gate at (**F**).

The return journey from Bingley Way is 12 km and from the Charcoal Kiln Rd entrance 8 km.

# **Bird Of The Month**

#### **By Luke Downey**

For June I chose the Yellow-tailed Black-Cockatoo, a huge black cockatoo with a loud call that is well-known in our region.

Yellow-tailed Black-Cockatoo (Zanda funerea)

Size: 55-65cm Status: Fairly common breeding resident

The Yellow-tailed Black-Cockatoo is a huge cockatoo and is actually one of the biggest parrots in the world. It is mostly black, with pale feather margins, and a bold, contrasting yellow cheek and yellow panels in the long tail. Male birds can be differentiated by having a dark bill and pink eye-ring, whereas females have a pale grey bill and dark eye-ring. Both have pale feet. Yellowtailed Black-Cockatoos also lack a distinct crest, though can raise their crown feathers when excited. Immature birds are like females with a pale bill, but browner overall. They usually occur in pairs to flocks, sometimes numbering hundreds. They feed primarily in pine plantations locally, though also feed on natives such as banksia, hakea or trees with hard capsule-like seeds. Sometimes they also gouge out borer grubs from branches, leaving large chew-marks on trees. Yellow-tailed Black-Cockatoos

have a very slow and buoyant flight with deep laborious wingbeats, and are very distinctive if seen flying.

Their call is a loud screeching "wee-aarr" that is quite distinct, they also give rolling chuckles in flight. The immature birds produce a very tiring raspy begging that is near-incessant.

Yellow-tailed Black-Cockatoos are common in most wooded habitats, such as forest, woodland, parks and pine plantations, sometimes ranging into urban areas. They favour the pines for food, though require large hollows for nesting. The similar Glossy Black-Cockatoo is rarely seen locally, and lacks the yellow cheek and has a red tail panel instead. Keep an eye out for these large and charismatic cockatoos, they are always an enjoyable bird to see! (photo from Google images)



I hope you're all keeping warm as we get further into the cold and wet months. I know for many volunteers, particularly in the RFS, SES and wildlife organisations that the weather has meant more time away from families helping our community and, with this past week being volunteer week, I want to send my thanks to everyone who gives up their time to give back - thank you.

There's been a lot happening both locally and across the region that I want to let you know about.

Firstly, roads. I was pleased to see the Weeroona Drive remediation works completed. Thank you to all you who had spoken to me about the need for work to repair patches along the road (including my 8 year old who persistently points out things I need to work on for our region). # Spinach Soup with Smashed Feta & Walnuts

Takes: 20 minutes Enough for 2.

- 2 onions
- 2 packets frozen spinach 250g / 9oz each, defrosted
- 2 cups chicken or veg stock
- 200 g feta (7oz)
- 2 large handfuls roast walnuts
- 1. Heat a generous glug of olive oil in a medium saucepan on a medium heat. Peel and slice onion and add to the pot with a pinch of salt to help the onion soften. Cook covered, stirring occasionally for 10 minutes or until onions are soft.

  2. Add spinach and stock and simmer for a few minutes. Taste and season with extra salt if needed, remembering the feta is going to bring a lot of salt.
- 3. Divide hot soup between two bowls and top with crumbled feta and chopped walnuts.

# What Is Wild-Life Friendly Fencing?

In the past decades the dedicated people at Possumwood Wildlife hospital in Bywong have rescued, organised veterinary treatment and rehabilitated thousands of wild animals: mostly kangaroos and wallabies, but also wombats, possums, birds, bats and reptiles that were caught and injured in wire fencing on properties in our district. Animals get caught as they try to make their way to water, food, shelter and safety.

I write the following as an advocate for wildlife and all animals, having learned of the hurdles to humane co-existence over years of environmental reporting and research, including in recent years volunteering with the Australian Wildlife Protection Council. I learned of the lethal hazards in much traditional fencing design. I also helped encourage our previous council (pre-amalgamation) to develop the wildlife-friendly fencing design that is in the planning instrument for rural residential properties. More on this animal friendly fencing design, below.

Steve Garlick and Rosemary Austen from Possumwood tell me that fencing injuries represent the largest number of rescues they do. Today they are regarded as national experts in the field of fencing injuries, treatment and rehabilitation. The physical injuries that occur from being caught in a wire fence include hip dislocation or fracture, loss of a limb, severe wounds, head injuries, ligament and tendon damage and severe dehydration. Stress is a huge component for a wild animal caught in a fence. At worst, the wild animal caught in a fence can be preyed upon and eaten alive by foxes and passing dogs or have their eyes pecked out and tongues eaten by crows while still alive. Rescuing, treating and rehabilitating a wild animal caught in wire fencing can be a huge effort and costly.

Many old fences in the area contain barbed wire. Injuries from barbed wire are horrendous. Yet, even today landholders are sometimes encouraged to go for maximum wire designs and barbed wire – denying wildlife safe passage to water, feed and shelter. This approach can also lead to traffic accidents when property fencing allows no escape route from neighbouring roads. Recently, local members of the Australian Wildlife Protection Council made representations to QPRC with concerns about the design of some recent subdivision fencing, accompanied by Dr Austen from Possumwood testifying on her experience of the consequences. Council is being urged to support/enforce its existing wildlife-friendly fencing standard for boundary fences with development.

The following elements of that animal-friendly fencing standard are a useful guide for landholders who want to modify existing old fencing or erect new sections and be kind to wildlife and at the same time protect other animals such as horses.

# No Barbed Wire Image at right provided by Possumwood

- height 1.2 metres or less (unless higher required for stock like deer)
- one 4.0 mm high tensile, **high visibility PVC coated wire** on top ('horse sighter' or similar)
- one carry 2.5mm high tensile wire at least 300mm below the top wire. This distance between the top two wires is to avoid kangaroos/wallabies catching and twisting a leg as they jump over. (Possumwood has rescued many joeys in recent times caught in this way).
- one bottom 2.5 mm high tensile wire at least
  150mm above the ground. This distance
  from the ground is to allow passage of wildlife
  at ground level. Consider small joeys, echidnas, lizards and other reptiles, wombats...

Also hazardous is hinged wire, ringlock or mesh, when it is extended to ground level or in a loose fashion extends towards the top wire without the due 300 mm gap. Considering this, residents with old fences featuring barbed wire, particularly facing local Greenways, are encouraged to take off the barbed strand and otherwise ensure safe passage through the neighbourhood. Many people have done this by cutting a portal/opening at the bottom of a hinged or mesh fence. Or removing

a bottom wire that is near the ground.

**Postscript:** At its 14 May meeting QPRC council voted to rationalise differing development control fencing standards (for subdivision) within the amalgamated council to favour the animal - friendly specifications developed by former Palerang Council. Testimony by Possumwood's Steve Garlick regarding the daily toll of wildlife fence injuries he attends, was persuasive.

# Nature Notes – May 2025

After a rather dry April, May has delivered some good falls of rain. The ground is quite damp now and the weather still warm, so the countryside should enter Winter looking green and healthy.

It will be a while now before there is any colour – other than the interesting tapestry of shades of green – evident amongst the vegetation. It looks as if it will be a good flowering season for the Wattles. The local Silver Wattles (Acacia dealbata) are heavily laden with buds, as are the many other species of Wattles planted here.

There is one little plant almost in flower – the Urn Heath (Melichrus urceolatus) is bearing lots of long cream buds. This is one of several local heath plants. It grows to only about 40cm tall, is densely covered with sharply pointed leaves and is one of the first heath plants to flower. The tubular cream flowers produce nectar and are attractive to some of the smaller Honeyeaters such as the Eastern Spinebills.

The wet weather seems to delight the local ducks. There were several flocks – both Wood Ducks and Black Ducks foraging along Norton Road recently.

A month or so ago, the flock of Sulphur-crested Cockatoos that visit here suddenly diminished in size from 100+ birds to about forty. The people in the road who throw out some seed for them and the other seed-eaters were a bit worried as to what had happened to them. But suddenly they are all back again. There are also two young ones with them now – still begging raucously for their parents to regurgitate some food for them.

The five long-term resident Crested Pigeons were joined recently by two others - and then two more. The Whitewinged Chough family has also expanded.

Winter – the quiet season – will soon be here. But there's usually something interesting to be seen in Wamboin at any time of the year.


early Bathurst racing days when you spent all day in front of the TV watching the great race. Another feature were the go karts showing our next generation of enthusiasts.
